### **From our Minister**



Yves Congar was just 10 years old when World War I began and the French town, Sedan, where he lived was invaded by the German army and then occupied for much of the war. His father was among the men deported by the Germans to Lithuania. His mother, Lucie Congar encouraged him to keep a diary and what resulted was a lucid description of a military occupation, complete with written narrative and coloured sketches.

They provide a unique historical insight into the war from a child's point of view. What he witnessed had such a profound effect on him that he felt called to bring to others the hope of Christ; Encouraged by a local priest Daniel Lallement, Congar entered the diocesan seminary, becoming a Dominican friar, priest, and theologian.

Centuries earlier the prophet Jeremiah was an eyewitness to the invasion of Jerusalem by Nebuchadnezzar. He wrote down his observations in his 'diary'—the book of Lamentations. Despite these distressing times, the prophet found hope in the heart of God. He wrote:

"Through the LORD'S mercies we are not consumed, because His compassions fail not. They are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness" —Lamentations 3:22-23

We continue to see invasions, occupations and war in our world, and we continue to hold those places in prayer. But also personally we may face times of trouble which effect our lives. But these times of trouble do not last forever. We can choose to allow ourselves to become over run by these things, or like Yves and Jeremiah, turn instead to God, and find there a support and solace. For we have a hope beyond that of the world: a faithful heavenly Father. The Lord's compassions are new every morning, and His faithfulness is great!

### Did you know?

### St Mary's Church Organ

The organ currently residing in St Mary's Church is a relatively recent addition, in 1989 the original instrument was in a poor state of repair and the Church was unable to afford to restore it. A new organ would also have been too expensive and so it was decided to try and source one second-hand. In 1990 a Dalladay Organ built in 1924 and installed in East Street Methodist Church in Tonbridge, Kent, came onto the market for £750. The price was right so Trevor Warland and Alan Richardson, who were both organists, were delegated to establish the feasibility of dismantling it and transporting it to Ringstead. Now both men were accomplished musicians but neither had any experience of dismantling and reassembling organs. Despite all this Trevor's confidence and Alan's skill and attention to detail proved to be the ideal combination to undertake this difficult task.

The organ was duly dismantled and Alan meticulously labelled and photographed every part before loading it onto the trailer and roof rack attached to his car. In total six journeys were required to transport the whole machine. The final journey was made in a 7 tonne lorry as the remaining parts were too big for trailer or roof rack! The parts were stored in garages, attics and sheds all over Ringstead to await assembly in the Church. It was decided that the work would commence

after the Flower Festival in September 1990.

Most of the reassembly work was carried out by Trevor and Alan and required two evenings and a Saturday each week. They were given some technical help by John Plunkett from Norwich, whose hobby for many years was the restoration of pipe organs. The organ was reassembled and working in time for a Church

service on Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> August 1991. A recital was held on Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> October following a blessing by the Ven. Bernard Fennyhough, the Archdeacon of Oakham.

I was born in Woking in 1943 and lived with my grandparents in Old Woking, Surrey for 7 years as my father was a serving officer in the Royal Navy. In 1950 we moved around the corner into a brand new council house which was great with plenty of room which I also thought was great. I loved music-and still do- so joined both the church and school choirs and was privileged to sing solo in Salisbury Cathedral. If I remember correctly I think I sang 'O for the wings of a dove'.

I passed my 11 plus and attended Surbiton Grammar school, left school at 16 and went into the engineering industry working primarily in the aerospace sector.

I loved motorcycling and took part in motor bike scrambling and trials riding, and later competed in car rallies driving my modified Mini on overnight rallies.

I met my wife Sue in1962 at a Rolling Stones gig at our local dancehall and we were married in 1966. I also found out that Sue's Auntie Bronwin knew my mother during the war and knitted baby clothes for me – what a coincidence

My uncle Danny was a paramedic in Woking but moved to Barton Seagrave and he persuaded Sue and me to move so we came to Raunds in 1969 and raised 2 children here. I became involved with both Windmill and Manor schools and was Chairman of Governors at Windmill for a number of years. It was also the time when I started my journey of faith and became a steward in Raunds Methodist Church and also became a Circuit steward for a while before joining the Shared Church in Ringstead.

I continued my career in engineering working for 22 years at a major design/manufacturing company of defence systems for the Ministry of Defence. I was made redundant in 1988 but continued working in the industry and was part of the management team in organising the Farnborough Airshow. I then worked at Timsons Printing for a couple of years before moving back to working in London in the oil and gas industry until I retired.

I've been extremely fortunate during the years to have travelled overseas on many occasions as part of my job and some places I wouldn't like to visit again but all the times I have been away I have been blessed with the support of my wife Sue who looked after our family.

### Since 1985, Rotary's key humanitarian priority has been to rid the world of polio.

Rotary initiated this campaign at a time when there were over 1,000 polio cases a day in 125 countries, paralysing and even killing children. Today, the number of cases is down by 99.9%. Over the last 39 years, Rotary members, working with communities around the world, have contributed more than US\$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to the fight to end polio. Inspired by Rotary's volunteer commitment and fundraising success, the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) was launched in 1988. This remarkable partnership includes Rotary, World Health Organization, UNICEF, the US Center for Disease Control & Prevention and, more recently, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and GAVI the Vaccine Alliance. All these organisations work alongside governments of the world to end polio.

Because of our efforts, nearly 19 million people who would otherwise have been paralysed are walking, and more than 1.5 million people are alive who would otherwise have died. Despite there only being a handful of cases left in the world, continued campaigning, health worker training and vaccination programmes are essential to stop the disease returning and ensuring the world is certified poliofree. Over 400 million children still have to receive their polio vaccinations by the GPEI partners multiple times every single year in more than 50 countries. Failure to eradicate polio could result in as many as 200,000 new cases worldwide every year within a decade.

Every year we plant Crocuses to remind us of our commitment and our promise to the children of the world; their colour purple references the dye used on the hands of children to indicate they have received the oral vaccine. On Friday 25<sup>th</sup> October we planted 4,000 crocus bulbs along the path outside the Shared Church.

cake, bought from our stall, prayed or got involved in any way at all...... THANK YOU from us for the support you have given and for your encouragement.

Work has already begun for the 2025 Appeal.

And yes, the fox hot water bottle and cover was safely packed and is on its way to a needy family.



# The Romans Course

## Explore the Letter to the Romans

The Romans Course is a ten-session programme which helps you study Paul's letter to the Romans. The course tackles ten big themes found in the book of Romans which are key to understanding the Christian faith:

- Gospel How can we become confident in our faith?
- Sin What's wrong with the world?
- Salvation What's so amazing about grace?
- Peace How can we find rest in a stressful world?
- Freedom How can we avoid negative cycles?
- Hope What has God promised?
- Mystery If God is sovereign, what is our role?
- Devotion How can we live full on for God?
- Community How can we live together in love?
- Mission How can we be ambitious with the gospel?

We are planning to run these each week on a Monday afternoon and a Thursday evening starting with session 1 on Monday 16<sup>th</sup>at 2:30pm, and Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> September at 7:30pm. The Monday session will be in person in the school room, while the Thursday evening one will be via zoom.


